

Dr. Miller received her medical education from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine. She then completed her residency in Internal Medicine at Greenwich Hospital, a Yale Hospital, followed by a fellowship in Infectious Diseases at the University of Minnesota. She has been at Albany Medical Center since 1991.

Dr. Miller's experience with persons with HIV infection began at Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx, New York, where she worked as an Attending Physician prior to moving to Minnesota. Although she had treated persons with AIDS during her residency, it was at Montefiore that she determined to pursue a career that would focus on the care of HIV-infected patients.

Dr. Miller's activities include clinical care, direction of the HIV Clinic at Albany Medical Center, direction of the Title IV Program, the Clinical Scholarship, and the Clinical Fellowship at AMC, education of students and house officers, and participation in clinical research. The Scholarship is a two year program designed to train health care providers in both the clinical care and the public policy of HIV; it is funded by the NY State Department of Health. The Fellowship is a one-month program for providers already caring for persons with HIV, keeping them up-to-date with clinical thinking. The Title IV Program increases access to care for Women, Children, and Families affected by HIV, particularly focusing on case management and access to research.

With others, Dr. Miller has developed hospital policy and implementation for HIV testing and for prophylaxis against HIV after sexual assault. In conjunction with Pediatrics, she provides care for women at the Maternal Child Coordinated Care Clinic.

Research interests have included the development of resistant herpes in persons with HIV, adrenal insufficiency in patients treated for wasting syndrome with medroxyprogesterone, the problems encountered in post-assault HIV prophylaxis, as well as numerous antiretroviral studies undertaken by the Division.
